MONEY COLLECTING

As a result of a new financial system being implemented by the Department, we will now collect all monies at the Administration Office.

The procedures will be as follows:

All money sent to the school is to be brought to the Administration Office and placed into the letterbox slot, that is on the front wall near the counter. This will allow payments to be placed securely, even when the office is not open. Please do not leave money on the counter.

We ask that the envelope be marked with your child's name, class, and what the payment is for to allow the payment to be processed.

The office staff will administer all money, and a receipt will be issued to the family, which will go to the student's class teacher to send home.

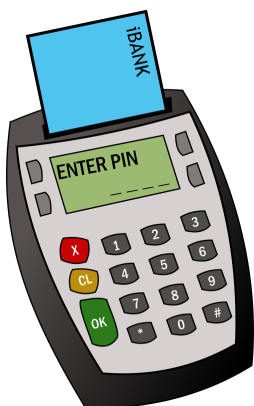
These changes will ensure better handling of all monies, and reduce disruption to teachers and students.

A reminder that the preferred method of all monies coming into the school, is the Payment On Line facility through the school's website. This procedure allows payments to be made 24 hours a day and provides an immediate receipt to your email.

At the bottom of every note that requires payment there will be a section for cash, cheque, credit cards and Payment On Line, for your convenience.

Canberra Excursion 2016-Parliament and Civics Education Rebate (PACER)

Students from Gwandalan Public School will soon be undertaking an educational tour of the national capital. Students will be given the opportunity to participate in a variety of educational programs with a focus on Australia's history, culture, heritage and democracy.

The Australian Government recognises the importance of all young Australian being able to visit the national capital as part of their Civics and Citizenship education. To assist families in meeting the cost of the excursion the Australian Government provides extra funding for each student towards the total cost of the excursion. This is known as the Parliament and Civics rebate program and is paid directly to the school upon completion of the excursion.

During Term 3 we will be connecting our learning from the birds and the Wetlands to study the book "The Best Beak in Boonaroo Bay" by Narelle Oliver. This book also ties in with the Olympics as it is based on a competition.

This term we will also be looking further into the Olympic Games, with a focus on the Olympic values of Friendship, Excellence and Respect. We have also looked at the Paralympic promotion on youtube called "We're the superhumans". 2A were amazed at the skills of these athletes.



4E Class Work

Students in 3/4 E had the opportunity to completed a project on an Australian bird of their choice. These are just a few examples of the wonderful work that was brought in.

AUSTRALIAN KING PARROT

Where They Live
Australian king parrots range from north and central Queensland to southern Victoria. They are frequently seen in small groups with various species of raptors. Further from their normal eastern upland habitats, they are also found in Canberra during winter, the outer western suburbs and north shore of Sydney, and the Cammerlang Gorge in central Queensland.

Breeding
Australian King Parrots lay their eggs on a bed of decayed wood-dust at the bottom of a deep hollow in the trunk of a tree. Often the entrance is high in the tree (20m) but the eggs are near the ground (0.5m).

LIFE EXPECTANCY
As pets, they have limited talking ability and normally prefer not to be handled, but they do bond readily to people and can be very devoted. Life expectancy in the wild is unknown, but some pets have been known to live up to 25 years.

Size
Both males and females are about 43cm (17in) in length including the broad tail.







Fairy Penguins

What type of animal are penguins?
Penguins are birds that don't fly. They have a black, feathered body and large, webbed feet. They have a small, pointed beak and a small, round head. They are found in the southern hemisphere.

How many species of penguins are there?
There are 17 species of penguins. They are found in the southern hemisphere (Australia, New Zealand, Antarctica, sub-Antarctic islands, South America and Africa).



Why do penguins waddle?
Waddling is the most efficient form of movement for penguins. Little legs and big feet make movement awkward on land, but waddling helps by using a westerly swing of hips, allowing the penguin to keep its body forward.

How long are they for?
The average height of a penguin is 1.2m (4ft) and they weigh 2.5kg (5.5lb).

Where do they live?
Penguins are found in the southern hemisphere. In Australia, they are found in the south-eastern states of Victoria, New South Wales, South Australia and Western Australia. They are also found in the southern ocean islands.

How do they differ from other birds?
Penguins are unique in that they are the only birds that can fly underwater. They have a special adaptation called a 'flipper' which allows them to move their wings in a way that creates lift in the water. They also have a special adaptation called a 'countershading' which allows them to blend in with the water when they are swimming.

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CASSOWARY

What is a Cassowary?
A Cassowary is a large species of bird that can't fly. It is found in the rainforests of north-eastern Queensland and is a ground dwelling bird.

How do they look?
Cassowaries have large bodies covered in long black feathers that look like hair. They have a blue and black head and neck, which can change colours depending on their mood.





How do they move?
Cassowaries have a helmet-like crest or horn on their head which can grow to about 18cm.

How do they grow?
Cassowaries grow up to 1.5m - 2m in height and weigh up to 75kg - 100kg when fully grown, making it the third tallest and second heaviest bird in the world.

What do they eat?
Cassowaries are omnivores, which means they eat plants and animals. Their main sources of food are fruit, seeds, shoots, fungi and insects.

How do they live?
Cassowaries can live for about 30 - 40 years. They live in small groups and are solitary birds. They are found in the rainforests of north-eastern Queensland.

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Wedge Tailed Eagle

Wedge Tailed Eagle
I have chosen the Wedge-tailed Eagle for its Grace and Beauty as it fly's with its wings full spanned, it looks amazing. The wedge tail eagle is Australia's largest bird.

Habitat
The Wedge-tailed Eagle is found across Australia also in parts of Southern Papua New Guinea, but mostly in wood land areas with fine grass groundcover.

How does it Live
They build their nests in both living or dead trees and usually the tallest ones. They also build their nests where there is a good view of the surrounding countryside. The Wedge-tailed Eagles can fly up to 2km high and soar for up to ninety minutes.





Daily Life
The wedge tailed eagle spend hours in the morning hunting for food they have amazing binocular vision: they will view their territory from the treetops. After they hunt in the morning they will sit on perches or glide in the air circling their territory.

Breeding
The wedge tailed eagle stays with their partner for life. They are territorial and live in the one area for a long time, they build their nest with sticks and leaves: they are very large around 1.8m across and 3m deep. Both of the eagles share the duties of making the nest, the incubation and feeding the chicks. Breeding season is April to September but mainly in July.

Size
The Wedge-tailed Eagle has a huge wingspan as it is ranged from 182cm to 232cm long, it also has a fairly large body size as well as it is ranged from 85cm to 106cm and the body weight for a male is around 2kg to 4kg as the female is 4.2kg to 5.3kg. A wedge tail eagle can live for up to 20 years.

What do they Eat
Wedge-tailed Eagles eat mammals and reptiles, these animals are rabbits, wallabies, small kangaroos, snakes, lizards, large birds, possums, foxes, and so on their main diet is rabbits, wallabies, and small kangaroos, they usually attack their prey when they are weak, dying or dead.

Protected
The wedge tailed Eagle is now protected by the National parks and wildlife. It is illegal to trap or kill them.

For parents that do not have internet access, computer kiosks will be available in the Library from 3pm-3.20pm on Tuesday 2nd August and Wednesday 3rd August, for parents to make their own bookings.

Parents may also phone the school on 49761318 for support. Interviews will run for 10mins and we appreciate your support with sticking to this schedule. If you require more time, please contact your teacher to make alternative arrangements.

From 3pm onwards on Tuesday 2nd August you will be able to access the booking system.

PUMPKIN



In Season	Autumn & Winter
What to Look For	A hard thick skin, heavy for its size.
How They Grow	Pumpkins are grown from seed on a vigorous ground running vine
Nutrition	Vitamin A, Vitamin C and dietary fibre and potassium.
Cooking	Boil, sauté, steam, bake, deep-fry or microwave. Serve as a vegetable, add to soups, pies or casseroles.
Storage	Store whole in a cool, dark, well-ventilated place for up to 2 months. Place cut pumpkin in an airtight container and store refrigerated for up to 7 days.

PUMPKIN SOUP

Pre heat oven to 180 degrees.

Arrange pumpkin, carrots and onion on baking trays, lightly brush with oil. Bake approx 15 to 20 mins, or until tender with a fork.

Add potato to stock and boil until tender.

Add baked vegetables to stock. Combine using a stick mixer or use a blender or food processor for a creamier texture.

750g cubed pumpkin
1 large onion quartered
2 large carrots chooped
1 large potato
1 litre made up veg stock.
1 table sp of oil
